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ROMAC District Update

Emilia and Dad Tomas return home to Dili

A further update on our District sponsored child Emilia. I am pleased to report that Emilia completed all her planned Radiation therapy successfully. However, her treatment was further complicated by the Royal Children's Hospital Cardiologist picking up that she had asymptomatic heart failure. She was readmitted back into the Hospital in January for further treatment.

The cause of her heart condition was due to a combination of her cancer (the huge tumor required her heart to work overtime to circulate her blood) and her malnutrition and vitamin deficiency. She has been given medication to treat the condition.

In late January the treating RCH oncologist Michael Sullivan gave the medical all-clear for Emilia to return home to Dili. She will continue to have ongoing cancer care in Dili by Dr Bucens.

On Sunday February 3rd (nearly 10 weeks after she arrived), ROMAC organized the flights for Emilia and father Tomas to return home to Dili via Darwin.

What an amazing transformation for Emilia arriving in Melbourne in November a very sick and listless little girl until February a healthy, cheeky and wonderful little girl going home with her dad.

It was a very emotional farewell at the airport as the hosts Inez and Guenter and translator Lidia and myself all said our goodbyes.

Again, a big thanks to all the ROMAC volunteers, the host families from RC Mt Eliza and Strathmore, the Timorese translators and the amazing medical staff at RCH and Peter Mac.

Removal of Playground Equipment from home in Mt Eliza for transport to Sri Lanka

It is with great pleasure that I write to let you know that Rotarians from the Frankston North, Mount Martha & Mt Eliza Clubs joined forces to dismantle some commercial grade playground equipment from a private residence in Mt Eliza for transport to Sri Lanka where I am sure it will be enjoyed by local children. This task involved significant preparation and planning and in this regard we need to acknowledge the work of Rotarians Ross Schweitzer (Mt Eliza), Colin Stokes (Mount Martha) and David Hanlon (Frankston North). Thanks also to Peter Cribb (Rotary Club Flemington) and Rod Greer (RC Ocean Grove) for their advice. It was wonderful to have a committed team of Rotarians today: Alex Anderson, Roger Annear, Russell Cock, Simon Gillham, David Hanlon, Alan Harwood, Wayne Jenkins, Hardy Jurasckek, Geoff Magor, Ian McConnell, Roger Skipsey and myself. In particular, thanks go to Wayne Jenkins who visited the site on several occasions to help prepare for the day. The day commenced with the team coding each separate section of the equipment and then dismantling it from the top down. We were left with twelve upright poles that had been concreted in place. With the help of a jackhammer and crowbars the poles were all taken out of the ground. The team then moved each piece to the front of the house where it was collected this afternoon by Peter Cribb in the Donations in Kind truck for transport up to the City and then to be placed in a container with other playgrounds for shipping to Sri Lanka. Special thanks to Hardy Jurasckek who returned later in the afternoon to help Peter Cribb load the truck. This was a great opportunity for three Clubs in District 9820 to work together and I believe that a most enjoyable (and tiring) day was had by all.

Rotary: Give Every Child a Future A Rotary Centenary Project

Overview

2021 marks the centenary of Rotary in Australasia and provides a unique opportunity to celebrate Rotary's achievements over the last 100 years. To do this, Rotarians in Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands, in collaboration with UNICEF, plan to vaccinate 100,000 of the most disadvantaged children and adolescent girls across the Pacific to prevent:

- In women, cervical cancer
- In children, severe diarrhoea caused by rotavirus and meningitis, blood infections and pneumonias caused by pneumococcal disease

Context

While there have been improvements in immunisation services many children still miss out on vaccines. Three times more women die from cervical cancer in the Pacific than in Australia and every year, 1 in 18 children die before their fifth birthday In Kiribati. Many of these lives could be saved by vaccines.

The Project

Rotary will work with UNICEF to introduce three life-saving vaccines across nine Pacific Island countries; the Cook Islands, Kiribati, Nauru, Niue, Samoa, Tokelau, Tonga, Tuvalu and Vanuatu. The Asian Development Bank is financing the introduction of these vaccines into four of the countries (Vanuatu, Tonga, Samoa and Tuvalu) while Rotary will fund regional and other supporting activities in those four countries and fully fund the programme in the other five countries.

Impact

Rotary and UNICEF are aiming to vaccinate 100,000 children over four years but this is just the beginning. This project will help strengthen the Pacific's broader health systems and ensure the sustainable delivery of these vaccines into the future. Generations will continue to benefit from this project. A truly inspiring Rotary legacy. Vaccines Human Papillomavirus (HPV) against cervical cancers Pneumococcal vaccine against pneumonias, meningitis and blood infections Rotavirus vaccine against severe diarrhoea Funds will support Vaccines Procurement Supplies Including cold chain equipment, storage and logistics Education Healthcare workers, communities and partners Technical support Policy, management and systems strengthening.



Guest speakers Victoria Chantra and Allan Klindworth of AECOM will share two approaches that have been used to support business resilience to natural disasters. They will draw upon their experiences working with communities following natural disasters such as Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans and devastating bushfires in Tasmania.
